Looking Forward Together

As we look beyond the 5 years of Transition Ministry we must now very seriously look at ideas for the future with neighbours and with Presbytery.

- There will be a reduction in the number of ministers in Edinburgh and in this part of the city. This may mean sharing a minister or a wider 'team ministry'. It might be possible to have different times for services in different places and more members leading worship.
- The buildings which we have are very expensive to maintain and some need costly upgrade. It may be that we can keep all buildings but maximize the income by having larger parts of some buildings for commercial rent for office, studios and performance space ... or we may need to let go of some buildings and look to use other community spaces or shop spaces to engage with local people.
- Our congregations are relatively small and elderly while the local community is much younger. Our priority must be to find the best ways to engage with the people who live and work here.

Following our review meeting in July with Presbytery & Ministries Council Presbytery has encouraged us to continue conversations

- with the Café-Style Gatherings
- with a pulpit exchange of the next three months
- with a further joint church conference on Saturday 12th October
