Dear friends

My good friend Jamie Stewart, an elder in Carntyne in Glasgow wrote The Glasgow Gospel, a Scots Bible and also Psalms for the People.

He died just a few years ago

aged 95 having found this new 'career' late in life—not translating into Scots but giving a 'rendition'. It led to Jamie giving the reflection at the Scottish Parliament not once but twice.

Psalm 148 is very appropriate for this 'Creation Time' month of September. The Psalm calls for all of creation to praise God—even the creepy-crawlies! The last part asks that God would give 'honest power' to us all in the way we live.

### We pray that people would be able to heat their homes not to have to choose between eating or warmth this winter.




Abbeyhill
