



the BBC Scotland channel are broadcasting a Christmas Day version of 'The Service' at 12noon on 25 December

AND

the Resolutions programme featuring the 'Scented Lament' will be shown on BBC1 Scotland at 12:35pm on New Year's Day. Rev Peter Gardiner and his wife Heidi will create a temporary installation called 'Scented Lament' that will be made using the aromatic herb rosemary, traditionally associated with remembering. Folk in parishes throughout Scotland have sent them lengths of rosemary which they will attach to a 180cm diameter plywood ring, creating a wreath as acts of remembering pandemic griefs and losses and naming them in God's presence.
