A Lent Study Group by Zoom

At least 79.5 million people around the world have been forced to flee their homes including nearly 26 million refugees, around half of whom are under the age of 18

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Graham Checkley tells us how Covid-19, plus a hostile immigration environment, produced a lethal combination.

On 26th June 2020, a suspect was shot dead by police after six people, including one police officer and 2 hotel staff, were stabbed at the Park Inn Hotel in Glasgow. Three of the people stabbed were asylum seekers, as was the suspect himself, Badreddin Abadlla Adam.

Mr Adam was a 28-year-old asylum seeker from Sudan, and perhaps he would never have left his home but for the Darfur conflict. After 17 years of oil-fuelled war, it is no surprise that he sought a better life abroad, but due the hostile immigration environment he was not to find one in the UK.

Under the hostile immigration environment every migrant is considered illegal until they can prove otherwise. Even if they are lucky enough to avoid detention centres, their day-to-day lives are handed over the organizations like the Mears Group. Refugees are big money for big business.

So, despite warnings from the Scottish Refugee Council of the potential dangers, Mears confined hundreds of already traumatised refugees in Glasgow hotels at the beginning of the Covid-19 lockdown. One asylum seeker, Adnan Walid Elbi, a refugee from Syria, died in a hotel, with clear evidence that the Home Office was aware he was suicidal. Badreddin Abadlla Adam was to follow an even more terrible path. **May they rest in peace.**

In our quest for peace, we seek your guidance, Lord, to strive for justice. Our common home is divided by fear and misunderstanding, by greed and lack of compassion. Send your Holy Spirit to comfort the dispossessed, and to give us the wisdom to share their load. May we offer the migrant and the refugee dignity and fairness, love, and the peace of Christ. Amen.



Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.
